

Remember, remember...

November is a month very focused on remembering.

We have the (rather ominous) nursery rhyme reminding us about the gunpowder plot, that we now celebrate in the UK as Bonfire Night.

We also have Remembrance Day, the national opportunity to remember the service and sacrifice of all those who have defended our freedom and way of life. We will be marking this as a church and wider community on Sunday 12th (see "What's On" in this newsletter for more details).

Why do we have days like these that focus on remembering history? So that we can pay our respects to those who have helped shape our present? So that we learn from our past? So we don't repeat past mistakes?

God is also in the business of making sure people remember their past. In fact, it may come as a surprise, but the Hebrew word for "remember" (which is zachor) is the most repeated command in the Bible. God uses this word on many occasions with the Israelites in the period after they escaped from Egypt. God's people would regularly get fed up whilst in the desert, declaring that they had it better when they were in Egypt. Time and time again, God reminds them: "I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery". This reminder appears not once, not twice, but on 87 occasions!

Human beings have a bad habit of misremembering the past, or not really

focussing on it at all. God wants us to remember it clearly, the good, the bad, and the ugly, so that we can live well in light of it.

On and around Remembrance Day, many of us wear red poppies to remember the lives of those lost who have fought in war. At this time, some people alternatively/also wear a white poppy. The white poppy represents a strong symbolic desire for peace and was first produced in the 1930s when the fear of another world war was brewing. It was, and still is, produced to remember all victims of war — both the lives lost of those who have fought in wars, and those who have been civilians.

These themes of remembering and desires for peace feel as relevant as they ever have been, with the devastating conflict taking place in Israel/Palestine. Many Christians have been praying for peace for a land and people with a very complex history. God's heart breaks for the lives that were lost in Israel on October 7th. God's heart breaks for the many more lives lost and still being lost in Palestine. We cry for a just peace for all those people. In the name of remembering the past to inform the present, I encourage folks to read further on the history of Israel/Palestine, and use this remembering of history to feed into your prayers for this terrible conflict. Remember the lives lost. Remember we have a God who loves all people, equally. Remember God loves you in your past, present and future, and use this to guide you forward.
